A WORD FROM OUR NEW PRESIDENT

"I am proud to assume the office of President and thank each of you for your confidence. Our association has grown, prospered and accomplished some very worth-while things under the excellent leadership we have had. I will do my very best to continue to make the 303rd Bomb Group Association meaningful for every member. Please remember that all officers and directors are your representatives. KEYNOTE SPEAKER



Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force, (Retired), Paul W. Airey was both interesting and chalenging as our featured speaker at the WDC reunion banquet. Now Field Director of the Air Force Sergeants Association, he contrasted the state of the Air Force today with what it was 41 years ago when the 303rd took up residence at Molesworth.

(The first mission of the 303rd was a ride to St. Nazaire, 17 November, 1942.) Chief Airey reported the Air Force is "alive and well", staffed with intelligent, patriotic and skilled personnel. Lacking the incentive we had in 1942, the big job for the Air Force today is trying to train men to "get obsessed and stay obsessed" with the defense of America. He urged that we, as veterans, do all we can to help keep America strong.

AN ABSOLUTE "GAS"

Many members had never head of THE AIRMEN OF NOTE when they walked into the ballroom for the WDC reunion banquet. It didn't take long to find out that this group of musicians was something special. They turned out in WWII Uniforms and quickly whisked the audience back to the early 40s as they played in the Glenn Miller style. Such numbers as String Of Pearls, In The Mood, Tuxedo Junction, Chatanooga Choo Choo, I'll Be Seeing You and more, really captivated everyone. It was a rare treat to hear such a fine group of musicians perform "our" music.

THE AIRMEN OF NOTE was formed in 1950 to carry on the goals of the late Major Glenn Miller. It had been his aim to give the troops the music they wanted to hear, and give it to them with that remarkable professionalism that was the Miller trademark. While they played for us in the Miller style, THE NOTE is equally at ease with current rock tunes. They actually have created their own new big band sound and have been acclaimed by music critics and musicians alike as one of the best.

THE NOTE Performs throughout the U.S. and, in fact, throughout much of the world, delivering their "in concert" sound to packed auditoriums wherever they go. Their schedule calls for spring and fall tours of the U.S. Each tour lasts about a month and typically covers 3 to 7 states. If you ever hear that THE AIRMEN OF NOTE are coming to your part of the country, make a special effort to hear them. You won't be disappointed. As Count Bassie once remarked, "They are an absolute 'gas'... one of the best I've heard... and I speak from more than a couple years experience. I don't care what kind of a bag you put them in, jazz or dance, the result will always be the same areat music!"

EX-POWs



Dr. Carl J. Fyler forwarded this picture of a special group of guys who gathered at the WDC reunion. The ex-POWs pictured, from left, are: Carl Fyler, 360th, Gene Breitenbach, 360th, Fred Barnes, 359th, Joseph Fertitta, 358th, Gene Girman, 359th, Vince DeLiso, 427th, Bruce Connors, 358th, William Simpkins, 358th and Millard Boren, 360th. Two more ex-POWs who attended the reunion but missed the photo were: Carl Neilsen, 359th and Charles Grace, 360th.

Dr. Fyler is a National Director of the American Ex-Prisoners of War, Inc. Carl reports that many Veterans Administration military records may be incomplete, creating difficulties when dealing with the V.A. Among other things, POW status may be missing. Fyler was a prisoner for 17 months, but the V.A. does not list him as an ex-POW. If you were a POW and have questions about benefits you may be entitled to, write to:

AIR FORCE ARTIST/HISTORIAN

Mr. Keith Ferris, the artist who painted the mural, "FORTRESSES UNDER FIRE" in the National Air and Space Museum was a guest speaker at our WDC reunion. Keith has been retained by the USAF to record in paintings the history of manned flight. His works include almost everything from the Wright brothers' plane to spacecraft.

Keith and his wife, Peggy, presented a slide show/lecture showing some of what goes into a Ferris painting. It's amazing! The research, including actual flight time, the geometric, skeletal drawings, the attention to the most minute details make his paintings more than art. They truly are Historical Art.

Keith showed the many steps in the painting of the 75'x25' mural at the Smithsonian. He never had attempted anything on such a scale until he was given that commission. He won't likely attempt another that large, judging from the problems he had to overcome in doing that one. It was interesting to learn that much of that mural was done with a 4-inch house painting brush!

The appearance of Keith Ferris at our reunion and his explanation of his art added new interest to the lithographic print offer that appeared in our July Newsletter. This print, pictured below, is the German side of the Ferris mural, "FORTRESSES UNDER FIRE". It pictures Lt. Klaus Bretscheider in his FW-190-8, Rauhbautz, closing on the 3 Forts, Marie, Special Delivery and Bonnie B. This is a limited edition print (850), numbered and signed by the artist. It is, of course, in full color and does not include the inset photo of Keith.

SPEAKING OF SPECIAL REUNIONS . . .

There was a unique "Gathering of Angels" (Hell's Angels, that is) at the Holiday Inn, South, Dallas-Ft. Worth International Airport, Texas, last Memorial Day week-end. The crew of "Lady Luck", 360 Squardon, 303rd Bomb Group held their very first reunion since being separated in 1943.

Attending were: Lloyd D. Griffin, Pilot, Walter C. Swanson, Co-Pilot, William M. Preston, Navigator, Robert L. Taylor, Bombadier, William E. Eason, Engineer/Top Turret, Vernon E. Schwartz, Radio Operator, Robert Plummer, Ball Turret, Paul Henderson, Waist Gunner, Lynwood Wiegand, Tail Gunner, Walter Melton, Crew Chief. Missing were the other members of the ground crew, the other waist gunner, Samuel L. Edwards (present whereabouts unknown) and the original ball turret gunner, Sgt. Rheaume, deceased.

The crew flew missions from Molesworth from March 1943 to July 1943 for, then Squadron Commander, Lewis E. Lyle. Sgt. Rheaume was shot down in May 1943 while flying with Lt. Plocher's crew. He was a POW for 23 months and died of a heart attack in 1978. Robert Taylor was shot down over Hamburg on July 25, 1943 while flying with another crew. He was a POW until liberated in April 1945. Another crew reunion is planned for 1985.

Thanks to Robert Taylor for sending this information. Anytime something happens to you that would interest other 303 rders, send the details to the Newsletter editor. The address now appears on page 1. In checking the names above against the roster, it appears that only four are members of the Association. How about getting the rest of the crew to join? They might even consider moving the next reunion to 1984 at Molesworth! If anyone has any information about the missing waist gunner, Samuel L. GROUP CAPTAIN JEFORIE By Nathan Smith

In 1942, aboard the Queen Mary, enroute to Greenock, Scotland, I became acquainted with a Royal Air Force Sergeant. He had just completed fighter pilot training in Canada. Along with about twenty other Sergeant Pilots, he was on his way back to England to report to an airdrome in Kent, northeast of London. He told me he would be flying a Super Marine Spitfire, the hottest fighter the RAF had.

We spent a lot of time together as the Queen raced across the Atlantic on her zig-zag course. By the time we docked, we each knew the other's life history and were fast friends. He gave me his address and telephone number in East Ealing, London. He made me promise to visit his parents on my first pass and as often as I could. Forty-one years later, I still remember the phone number. 1-3-5-7-9.

The 303rd ground echelon arrived at Molesworth on Sept. 12, 1942, after a hair-raising ride in English lorries driven by "nuts" who insisted on driving on the wrong side of the road. The air echelon got there a couple of weeks later and the 303rd settled down to life in "Merrie" England. Then, during the second week of October, I got a pass to London.

When the train arrived, I "rang up" Jeforie's parents. His father said they had been expecting me and gave me directions to get to East Ealing by subway and bus. I arrived about an hour later.

Jeforie's parents were delightful. They put me up in Jeforie's room. Then they introduced me to Kathleen, Jeforie's fiancee. She was twice as pretty as the snaps that Jef had shown me. She ran a small lathe in binoculars factory a few blocks away. She was staying with Jeforie's parents because her own home was on the west side of London, two hours away by subway. I made several return trips and always was received like one of the family.

Jeforie's father was retired from some position in Scotland Yard and, during my several visits, showed me the sights of London. There seemed to be as much below ground as there was above. I got to see things that most G.I.s never even knew existed. I visited the rooms under the Houses of Parliament and the mechanical room of the tower bridge that housed the huge machinery which lifted the bridge to let boats go up or down the Thames. I even climbed the stairs inside the clock tower at Paliament and patted "Big Ben". On a couple of visits, I took Kathern to stage shows in London. Once I took her to the famous Windmill Theatre on Great Windmill Street just off Piccadilly Circus.

Then, one day back at Molesworth, I got a letter from my wife's older sister who fancied herself a gourmet cook. She informed me that London had the largest Chinese community outside China and requested that I get a

Chinese cookbook for her. I put four one-pound notes and the letter in an envelope. I sent it to Kathern with a note asking her to get the book for me. On my next trip to East Ealing, Kathern handed me the book. It was second-hand and looked like it had been well used. It was a real Chinese cookbook with millions of tiny, what appeared to be, bird tracks . . . not a word of English!

I sent the book to my gourmet-cook sister-in-law. The return letter was so hot, it's a wonder it didn't set the mail sack afire. My sister-in-law hasn't gotten over that one yet!

The days, weeks, months and even years passed slowly. Jeforie and I communicated by notes left on his pillow. We exchanged occasional letters and a few phone calls. Then, in February 1945, he landed his Spitfire at Molesworth. We had guite a reunion. I was aware that he had gone slowly up the ladder in rank, but a few days before his visit, he had been promoted to Group Captain. There were a few eyebrows raised by people who saw a Master Sergeant and the equivalent of a Bird Colonel beating each other on the back. In fact, a couple of guys tried to break up what they thought to be a fight between an American Sergeant and an RAF Officer. I introducted Jeforie to General Travis who got guite a laugh out of Jef's stories about Kathern and me "dating" while he was fighting the War. The General was even more interested in Jeforie's tales of shooting down nine V-1 rockets (buzzbombs), shooting up a pair of German locomotives and his encounters while flying escort for B-17s.


I didn't see Jeforie again until 1951. I was stationed near Oxford, on loan to the Royal Air Force for a year. On trips to London, my wife and I had the pleasure of visiting Jeforie, his wife and their two children. After 1951, we kept in touch by mail until 1969 when we made a trip to London and got to visit them once more.

By 1969, London had changed. The round-about street that made Piccadilly Circus had been closed. The Red Cross Club, where so many of us stayed, had been converted back into a hotel. The building had a large bronze plaque commemorating it as "Rainbow Corner" and telling of the millions of G.I.s who stayed there. The Red Cross snack room had been converted to, of all things a MILK BAR!

My wife and I went in to see what it was like. They were selling poor quality ice cream and frozen milk, They even had milk shakes made with frozen milk and some Englishtype sandwiches. I spotted a sign above the counter which read: "Hamburgers, Six Shillings". I jumped to the counter and ordered two. I paid for them and was handed a small paper bag. We each had two slices of coarse bread with a thin slice of ham between... nothing else. It was as big a disappointment as the first time I tried to buy a "Burger and Shake" in London in 1942. I got a CEREAL patty on a bun and POWDERED Milk whipped with an egg beater! Remember?

GREEN AND GROWING
