

Chord Inversions

Chord name stays the same as you move up and down the neck with the finger form inversions as shown. (follow the vertical arrows)

Same Form

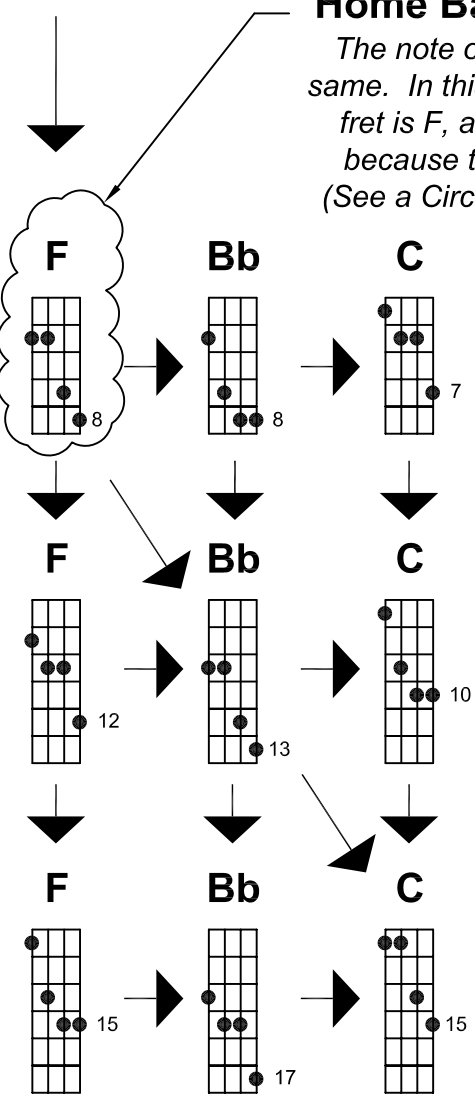
Chord names change as you move the same finger form up and down the neck as shown. (follow the diagonal arrows)

"In The Box"

Chord names change as you stay in one area without moving up and down the neck, similar to playing near the nut. (follow the horizontal arrows)

Home Base Chord Form

The note on the first string and the chord name are the same. In this example the note on the first string at the 8th fret is F, and the chord name is F. This is Home Base because the chord family (F, Bb, C) is in the Key of F. (See a Circle of 5ths diagram for more chord family info.)



Note:

The finger forms indicated are for major chords. Minor, 7th, and other chord forms are achieved by altering the major chord.
