[15. TELUS _ Making good privacy choices]

No matter how carefully you use your privacy settings, or how trustworthy your friends are, there will always be a chance that something you share online might be seen by more people than you originally planned to share it with.

Before you post anything, ask yourself these questions:

Is that how I want people to see me?

Could someone use this to hurt me?

Would I be upset if they shared it with others?

What could happen if someone shares it?

These days, a lot of employers check social media when they're deciding whether or not to hire someone. Don't post things that are offensive or discriminatory. That includes liking posts from friends and others who share that kind of content.

Don't post negative things about your current or past workplaces.

Instead, focus on sharing things that you're proud of or tell a good story about you...

... like running a marathon or volunteering with a charity.

Your friends are also trusting you to make good decisions about the things you post. In general, you should ask before you post pictures or videos of other people, especially when you post about children.

You should also make sure you limit access to these photos by using privacy settings, so only family and close friends can see them.

Also, before you share or like something that someone else has posted, ask these questions before sharing or liking a post posted by someone else: How will others feel about the content I'm liking or sharing? How will my friend feel if I share their post and it gets seen by a broader audience like their partner or employer?

Elsa: "Thanks for asking"]

If you're not sure whether it's ok to share, just ask.
