Starting Point

- We live in a world of "fourth generation warfare (4GW)" where the tactics of the weak confound the tactics of the strong.
- Nation-states confront criminal enterprises, fanatical opportunists, terrorists whose gang-like networks transcend national boundaries.
- These bad actors often slip through the cracks of our own security, military, and legal bureaucracies.

What Is Fourth Generation Warfare?

- What is it?
 - Stateless, or can be state, supported warfare w/ possible interstate spillover
 - Hides behind religion/ideologies
- Examples? WTC, anthrax attack, FRY, US vs. Iraq
- Why dangerous?
 - Current U.S. forces designed to fight against a nation state
 - Our over-reliance on technology
 - War and transnational crime intertwined hard to see enemy (gangs, mercenaries, narco-traffickers, religious extremists, rogue states, and mafias)
 - Can hit anytime, anywhere, anything and anyone

What Is Fourth Generation Warfare?

- Formless and most deadly kind of war
- 4GW ops are intelligence driven (i.e. WTC attack; China's hacker attacks on US.) Countering the threat requires an intensive intelligence effort to drive counter-4GW ops.
- Requires constant preparation and resourcefulness
- Distinguishing a combatant from a non-combatant can be extremely difficult (i.e. use of mosques or churches to plan terrorist attacks Levant/Asia; refugees/displaced persons infiltrated w/ agent provocateurs Balkans; exploitation of fragmented cultures w/in a country for purposes of breaking down a society al-Qa'ida vs US; exploitation of rules of engagement as in Somalia)

- We are seeing sub-national "bad actors" use guerrilla tactics, insurrection, sabotage and terrorism to subvert nation-states and challenge the established international system.
- Governments, politicians, and state militarysecurity apparatus of the west are trying to engage our 4GW foes in the tried and true conventional ways of the past.

"On one hand, you have to shoot and kill somebody; On the other hand, you have to feed somebody. On the other hand, you have to build an economy, restructure the infrastructure, build the political system. And there's some poor lieutenant colonel, colonel, brigadier general down there, stuck in some province with all that saddled onto him, with NGOs [nongovernmental organizations] and political wannabes running around, with factions and a culture he doesn't understand. These are now culture wars that we're involved in. We don't understand that culture. "



Three Block War

Current Trends

- America, prefers conventional combat where only the technologically strongest wins. Our fourthgeneration foes prefer 4GW judo, leveraging our addiction to technology and "throwing us" using our own bureaucratic weight and western thinking.
- Our enemy's "technology advantage" in the 9-11 attacks consisted of box cutters and ceramic knives, combined with a steely determination to die for a cause. It worked, and our vast militarysecurity-enforcement bureaucracy was virtually helpless to stop it.


Current Trends

 Today we continue to see the nature of conflict shift to a setting where the division between combatant, criminal opportunist and civilian is blurred; The urban guerilla (not to forget their rural counterparts) may be a religious zealot or a child for hire with an RPG.

Current Trends

- As technophiles, westerners are enraptured by the technology of our modern weapons their precision, but we have lost sight that people and ideas are the essence of why wars are fought.
- In the traditional view, the low-tech approaches of fourth generation warfare are the "tactics of the weak." However, they have repeatedly been successful in circumventing our military's far stronger conventional strategy, tactics, and thinking.

Consequences of Getting It Wrong

- War today is no longer a monopoly of the state.
- War is changing so that much of our cold war national security apparatus is being rendered obsolete or irrelevant.
- We must adapt and do so quickly.
- For example, our conundrum in Iraq is sustaining operations in the aftermath when the enemy "military" (along with enterprising criminals and trouble makers) transition into sub-national paramilitary gangs submerged within a society of politically wavering civilian groups.

- In the past, terrorism, guerrilla warfare, conventional warfare were used as tools to <u>foster</u> <u>change within a society or nation state.</u>
- Today 4GW uses insurgency terrorism, guerrilla warfare, and unconventional as tools to <u>foster</u> <u>change across societies and nation states by</u> <u>transnational non-state entities.</u>

- Gap between the "haves and "have nots" is growing.
- Economic, environmental, population growth/migration, and distribution of power mismatches exacerbate the situation.
- Places like Iraq, Afghanistan, Pakistan, Indonesia, Philippines, etc. are becoming training bases for a new breed of terrorists well schooled in 4GW

- Most men—especially men from non-western cultures and lessdeveloped areas—take great pleasure in waging war (van Creveld, Peters)
- Anti-war sentiment only prevalent in western/westernized cultures (Bozeman)
- Women appear to be just as capable as men of waging 4GW, for example, female suicide bombers



Anticipated 4GW Tactics

- Ambushes involving automatic weapons and rocket propelled grenades (RPG) or mortars.
- Planted mines, command or remote detonated mines and improvised explosive devices.
- Snipers and covert shooting attacks.
- Delay detonated car/truck bombs.
- Homicide/suicide bombers, attacking high density (and soft) targets – to include transportation systems and markets, shopping areas.

Challenges for the Nation...

- Against unconventional 4GW warrior classes, it may not be possible to mount attacks against critical vulnerabilities by conventional high tech dependant military forces
- We must implicitly recognize the value of placing people and ideas ahead of "technology" to truly win wars. Otherwise, fourth generation tactics of the weak will continue to confound the second-generation tactics of the strong.







Boyd's OODA Loop



The Battle of Algiers

• The movie looks in part at how to win a battle against terrorism and lose the war of ideas. Children shoot soldiers at point blank range. Women plant bombs in cafes. Soon the entire Arab population builds to a mad fervor. Sound familiar? The French have a plan. It succeeds tactically, but fails strategically.

4GW & Intelligence

- "Fourth generation war will require much more intelligence gathering, analysis, and a greater dissemination capability to serve a highly flexible, interagency command system. At the same time, the fact that fourth generation war will include elements of earlier generations of war means our forces must be prepared to deal with these aspects as well ... therefore, it will be essential for leaders to make an accurate analysis of the war they are about to enter.
- •The complex mix of generations of war with their overlapping political, economic, social, military, and mass media arenas makes determining the type of war we are entering more critical than ever".
